Two More GCF Donation Centers & Stores Open with More Expansion Coming in 2012 to Eastern North Carolina

Following the opening of the Leland GCF Donation Center & Store in the Spring of 2011, two more stores opened in the Fall, bringing the total of GCF Donation Centers & Stores in eastern North Carolina to 33. The two newest stores are located in Holly Springs near Sunset Lake and in Garner near I-40 and Hwy. 42.

Both stores were well-received in their communities by shoppers and donors and by people looking for employment. Whenever we open a new store it brings jobs that pay excellent wages plus full benefits. These jobs are strong additions to the community and are an important part of the mission of Goodwill Industries of Eastern North Carolina (GIENC®).

In 2012 new jobs will be available in Elizabeth City, Fayetteville and Holly Springs as three more GCF Donation Centers and Stores open. The Elizabeth City store will open first, sometime in the spring. It will be followed later by the Fayetteville store and finally with the Holly Springs store.

"We are happy to be adding a store in northeastern North Carolina," said GIENC® President Dennis McLain. "That store joins the Southern Shores store in that area of the state. We are committed to the people of eastern North Carolina and glad that we are able to expand and add new job opportunities for people who desire to improve the quality of their lives."

How Did We Almost Double Our Donation to the Food Bank This Year?

The goal in The Nature Center each year is to increase the amount of produce that is grown and donated to the Food Bank of Central and Eastern North Carolina. We tried several new varieties of fruits and vegetables this year. Our newest variety was the Banana Cantaloupe. It's not your run of the mill cantaloupe, so the insects and disease did not have a chance to find it yet. The volunteers started this cantaloupe from seed and it did quite well in the field, producing large, juicy sweet fruit.

We harvested over 650 pounds of sweet potatoes which we had not grown before. And our blueberries had a bumper crop yielding over 200 pounds. When you think about how small a

blueberry is, your realize how many it takes to total over 200 pounds!

Our success in the greenhouse was the best yet with several varieties of tomatoes grown early in the year. Our new greenhouse crops include acorn and butternut squash, bush beans, peas, sweet potatoes and many herbs that will be used for companion plantings which we hope will deter harmful insects.

The largest yields were from tomatoes, cabbage and sweet potatoes, foods very popular with Food Bank clients. For the year, we have donated 9170 pounds of produce to the Food bank.
