Food Bank of Central and Eastern North Carolina Benefits Year Round from Donations of Produce from the Nature Center

By the end of February 2011, the GCF Nature Center had already donated over 550 pounds of fresh produce to the Food Bank of Central and Eastern North Carolina. That's over 400 pounds more than was donated in the same period last year.

What's the difference? This year the Nature Center greenhouse is yielding a bumper crop of tomatoes for donation.

There are a number of advantages for using the greenhouse to grow produce, explained Kimi Dew, Nature Center coordinator.

"Of course temperature control is foremost in growing traditional summer vegetables during winter months," she explained.

"But the greenhouse also provides protection from insects that can damage crops. You can see the difference in the tomatoes that come from the greenhouse. They are untouched and appear almost perfect," she said. She explained that most of the tomatoes being grown in the greenhouse are regular field tomatoes, with only a few being greenhouse tomatoes.

"These tomatoes taste very good," she said. "It is unusual to find regular field tomatoes at this time of year, so that makes these tomatoes that we are donating very special."

The Food Bank of Central and Eastern North Carolina has enjoyed receiving donations from the Nature Center

over the last several years and looks forward to continuing to provide its clients with good, fresh produce year round.

Other groups are also benefitting from the Nature Center. With the 4,500 square foot greenhouse, there is plenty of room to prepare seedlings to be planted in vegetable gardens. Often there are too many seedlings to use in the Nature Center gardens.

"We have identified a number of community gardens in our area to whom we can donate seedlings," explained Dew. "All of these gardens help people in need by offering them free produce."

"We are so happy that we can share more than just the produce that we grow at the Nature Center," continued Dew. "With the seedlings, we are able to benefit to so many more people in eastern North Carolina."
